PROJECT: A Japanese Hall built in 1928 by members of the Japanese community and continued to function as a Japanese Hall until 2018 has been relocated to the Legacy of the Plains Museum (LPM) in Gering, NE. Here, the history of the Japanese and Japanese Americans from Nebraska and the High Plains will be preserved.

We have weathered setbacks, are not yet open, but are making progress. Grand Opening is delayed to 2024.

It Has Been A While: Due to the unforeseen issues of contracting with a new Exhibit Company and finalizing approvals for the Hall Building. we had many unknowns. We continued our outreach efforts by participating in many events including our exhibit with History Nebraska.

The Accession Committee has been very busy documenting the many wonderful artifact donations that continue to arrive.

We are excited to get this Summer 2023 update Newsletter out to all of you.

Building Update

After much time, energy, and expense, the decision has been made not to construct the proposed building addition. Our architect has been working with the NE State Fire Marshal's office since November 2022, to determine

necessary changes the addition would require. We have worked hard to preserve and, in some cases, bring back the original look and feel of Japanese Hall. Alterations to the entryway will severely impact the historical elements of the hall and impact the access for us to greet visitors. The installation of a sprinkler system (both floors) and firewall separation within the new addition between the stairway and the lift. The latter two items create significant cost increases.

The one item we have left to meet the State Fire Marshal's requirements is separation of the basement and main floor. This will be accomplished by construction of a firewall and door at the bottom of the stairs. Our contractor

has this on his schedule. Once completed we can allow the public into the building's main floor, after we get permission from the state fire marshal. Our plan is to allow the public to come in and view

the completed entryway and use the temporary exhibits we created with History Nebraska.

We have a list of numerous small items to get the building and grounds ready for use that are being worked on, the most significant being ground grade work to keep drainage water away from the building.

Preserving a Legacy: Japanese in Nebraska

Japanese Hall and LPM Open Two Exhibits at the History Nebraska Museum, Lincoln, NE

On April 20, 2023, History Nebraska and the Legacy of the Plains Museum celebrated the opening of two exhibits: of the Smithsonian: "Righting a Wrong" exhibit on the incarceration camps during WWII, and "Preserving a Legacy: Japanese in Nebraska from Early Immigration to Present."

The latter celebrates the rich history of Japanese immigration to Nebraska from the early 1900's and Nebraska's role in bringing people out of the camps during WWII. "Preserving a Legacy" includes artifacts from the Legacy of the Plains Museum, History Nebraska, and the contributions of many others.

During WWII, Nebraskans assisted students out of the camps to colleges, to employment opportunities at Boys Town and the Sioux Ordnance Depot outside of Sidney, Nebraska. Advertisements in camp newspapers brought Japanese out of camps due to the shortage of workers on farms and other places.

The "Righting a Wrong Exhibit" also showcases the Congressional Gold Medal Ceremonies that honored the Japanese Americans who fought for their country, the United States of America, as members of the Military Intelligence Service and 100th/442 Regimental Combat Team, a segregated unit, which is the most-decorated unit of its size and length of service in US Military History.

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Amache Pilgrimage

The Amache National Historic Act was signed into law in March of 2023, making Amache National Historic Site or the Granada War Relocation Center Site the newest of the National Parks.

On May 19-21, 2023, as a part of understanding this history, Vickie Schaepler followed the family of Annie Takamatsu Hagihara as they attended the Amache Pilgrimage. We researched the Sioux Ordnance Depot as Annie and her sister, Eriene, came out of Amache to work there, bringing her mother, Takino, who was a widower with them. (Fall 2021 JH Newsletter)

The Pilgrimage was an opportunity for families who have a connection with the site to learn and share stories of incarceration. Many others attended, who wanted to learn more about the camps. The community of Granada has a museum and hosted a lunch at their High School for all the participants – some had traveled great distances to participate. Hosted by the Amache Preservation Society, the University of Denver, the National Park Service, and the community of Granada. Many other organizations were included, the event created many special and poignant moments.

Local high school teacher, John Hopper and his students began a project to interview surviving incarcerates. Their work gained notice. Archaeologists from the University of Denver began to bring students who, with other groups, worked to restore a guard tower and barracks. It's now a National Historic Site, one of the closest camps to Japanese Hall and a part of the High Plains history.

Japanese Hall Exhibit Update

The Japanese Hall and History Project had a major setback last year when our former exhibit company, ended their contract and closed their doors. We worked diligently to find a new company and thought we would still open this year but sadly we were unable to achieve that goal. With a few building update issues, and the exhibit design team change, we decided to focus on getting our building opened and complete our exhibits.

The new company *Upland Exhibits* of Newton, Kansas, (formerly Flint Hills Design) is on target with a new schedule. We have been busy creating text, following new processes, choosing artifacts, and photographs to create the experience we hope each of you will enjoy.

The new date for opening is late spring of 2024. Our team of volunteers both in Gering and throughout the region have been clarifying, writing, and accessioning items.

Upland's team made their first trip to the site in January and braved the winter weather of Nebraska to meet with our team and to see, the site, the Legacy of the Plains Museum, and our Japanese Hall.

The accession team filled the building with our artifacts and Upland formed a vision of what will be our future exhibits. We are now meeting regularly with their team and look forward to completing the design, ready for installation in March 2024.

Outreach Update

The Kawasaki Reading Room hosted an exhibition, lecture, and reception at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln to highlight the history of the Japanese in Nebraska on March 24, 2023. The Trails and Rails Museum in Kearney, Nebraska, hosted a one-day workshop on April 1, 2023.
